Theme: A New Look at the United Nations and its Charter

Global Governance for Sustainable Future in a Fractured World

THE EVENT

The 26th International Conference of Chief Justices of the World seeks to bring together heads of judiciaries, heads of states & governments and civil society to address the most existential and profound challenges that humanity faces: violence and war, inequitable distribution of global wealth, irreversible climate change and problems arising out of scientific and technological advancement. The Conference is grounded in the conviction that these challenges can only be effectively addressed through strengthened international law and reformed global governance that promote unity, cooperation, sustainable peace and development and a safe future for humanity, especially for children and future generations.

CONTEXT

Existing multilateral institutions find it increasingly difficult to meet contemporary challenges as their mandates and processes are increasingly questioned and challenged by many countries and thought leaders. The world's only 'mandated' global governance organization, i.e. the United Nations, is in many respects struggling for effectiveness as it reaches its 80th anniversary in 2025. There is a growing sense that reform of the system must include changes to the Charter to reflect current and future needs.

Alternatively, some voices now see this moment as propitious for new beginnings of a different kind. In a polarized geopolitical world, perhaps it is time for 'smart coalitions'of nations willing to act together to advance global priorities, much like the European and other regional unions were born out of the need to promote peace, values, economic development and the well-being of their citizens.

Between these two lie many other options and pressing issues. City Montessori School believes that a 'Modern School must Act as a Lighthouse of Society', as a main actor in social transformation and must concern itself with the affairs of the age e.g. world unity, peace and the protection of our planet. Consequently, this year, we dedicate the 26th International Conference of Chief Justices of the World to explore the theme of 'A New Look at the United Nations & its Charter: Global Governance for a Sustainable Future in a Fractured World'.

OBJECTIVES & SCOPE OF DISCUSSIONS

The Conference aims to:

 Address the State of Global Governance by exploring the role of international law in maintaining order amid shifting global alliances and disengagement by major powers. Can issue-based alliances "Smart Coalitions" drive reforms where formal multilateral mechanisms struggle?

- Strengthen Multilateralism, including enabling middle powers to take on a leadership role where traditional superpowers are less engaged or disengaged.
- Evaluate legal responses to digital threats and global corruption (Cybercrime & Grand Corruption). How can legal systems balance change & continuity, i.e. adapt while preserving fundamental justice principles?
- 4. Tackle Climate & Health Crises through existing or new legal frameworks for climate litigation, pandemic response, and other environmental needs. From environmental protection to digital governance, how can judicial institutions safeguard the future?
- 5. Foster Judicial Cooperation with enhanced arbitration mechanisms, particularly in the context of the UN Charter, to resolve international disputes efficiently.
- 6. Develop a framework for protecting outer space from exploitation and weaponization or military uses.

CONCLUSION

This Conference seeks to build a roadmap for a just, sustainable, and rules-based global order in these challenging times. By fostering collaboration among chief justices, judges, legal scholars and thought leaders, it aims to reinforce the role of law as a stabilizing force in an otherwise rapidly changing world. The Conference also seeks to explore a more representative and democratic world order for a sustainable future.

ABOUT THE ORGANISER

The organiser of the Conference is City Montessori School, India, (a senior secondary school) recognised by Guinness Book of Records as world's largest school by pupils in a single city, and is a recipient of 2002 UNESCO Prize for Peace Education. The School is an NGO associated with the United Nations Department of Public Information (UN DPI).

The International Conference of Chief Justices of the World (ICCJW) was conceived and convened since 2001 consecutively by the champion of quality and value-based education, the Late Dr Jagdish Gandhi, Founder of City Montessori School, a doyen of world unity and peace and a passionate life-long advocate for a democratic and representative global governance structure.

The Conference is inspired by Article 51 of the Constitution of India which relates to promoting international peace and security, fostering respect for international law, encouraging settlement of international disputes by arbitration, and the maintenance of just and honourable relations between nations.



I am directed to refer to your letter dated 01.01.2025 on the above mentioned subject and to convey that in the light of extant instructions outlined in the Visa Manual, security clearance of Ministry of Home Affairs is required for an event <u>only if. (1)</u> there are foreign participants from **PRC Countries i.e.** Afghanistan, Iraq, Pakistan, Sudan, foreigners of Pakistani Origin and Stateless persons or (ii) the venue of the event falls under RAP/PAP area. The organiser of such events needs to apply to MHA on its online event clearance platform (<u>https://conference.mha.gov.in</u>) for obtaining the security clearance of MHA. Necessary instruction in this regard is annexed as Annexure-'A' for reference and future compliance.

2. For events, other than the two categories mentioned above, Indian Missions are authorised to issue '**Conference Visa'** to the Foreign Participants.

This association constitutes a commitment on the part of your organization to disseminate information and raise public awareness about the purposes and activities of the United Nations and issues of global concern. Associated NGOs are expected to focus a portion of their publications and information activities on the work of the United Nations. You are encouraged to cooperate with the United Nations Information Centres or Services in your country and with representative of other parts of the United Nations in the area of your expertise.

To confirm your NGO's association with DPI, your NGO must <u>create a profile in the Civil</u> Society Network (CSO Net). Please visit the website:

<u>http://esango.un.org/irene/?page=login_</u>and click on the last option, "Please Click Here To Add Your Organization" to create your profile. Please search the database to check if your organization already has a profile in the database. If so, you can update that profile.

I would like to take this opportunity to inform you that as an associated NGO, you are entitled to six grounds passes each year to enter the United Nations Headquarters in New York. On the <u>2014 Newly Associated Information Form</u> (attached), you may designate one main representative, two alternate representatives, and two youth representatives (between the ages of 18 and 32 years old) who will be granted annual United Nations grounds passes. Please email the completed form to <u>undpingo@un.org</u>.

The UN grounds passes will give your representative(s) access to the United Nations Campus in New York, including all <u>open</u> meetings of the United Nations bodies, which they can attend as observers. Representatives are also invited to attend the NGO Thursday Briefings organized by NGO Relations, featuring United Nations officials, government delegates and other experts from the NGO Community.

Your organization will start receiving emails of relevant United Nations material and information on United Nations conferences, seminars, briefings and other events following the creation of your CSO Net profile. Information on these events and announcements are also available on our website. We encourage your NGO to provide a link the DPI NGO Relations website (http://outreach.un.org/ngorelations) on your organization's website. We also encourage you to "LIKE" us on Facebook at <u>https://www.facebook.com/UNDPINGO</u>.

Before the end of each year, we will send information regarding the Annual Review, which will also be available on our website. In order to maintain your associated status with DPI, you **must complete the Annual Review form** by the deadline and appoint representatives for renewed grounds passes. Please note that your designated representative(s) should come to the DPI/NGO Resource Centre located in the UNITAR building on 45th Street and First Avenue in person with a government-issued photo ID to receive the grounds passe.

As part of the criteria to maintain association, you are also expected to keep NGO Relations informed of the activities you undertake and to send us relevant publications and other materials. In the case of an amendment to your organizational structure or bylaws, please send us a copy of the amended documents. In addition, you should inform us of all changes in your name or contact information (mailing and emails addresses) as well as any changes of NGO representatives. If you have any further questions please contact undpingo@un.org.

Use of the UN Emblem

Please also note that the use of the UN emblem is restricted by General Assembly resolution 92(i), adopted in 1946. This resolution states that in order to prevent the misuse of the UN seal and emblem, it cannot be used without the authorization of the Secretary-General. NGOs are <u>not</u> allowed to use the official UN emblem on their websites, stationary, business cards or other items. NGOs may, however, request authorization to use the modified UN emblem which requires written approval and authorization by the Office of Legal Affairs. Please refer to the attached guidelines for further details on the use of the UN emblem.

Association of NGOs with DPI does not constitute their incorporation into the United Nations system, nor does it entitle associated organization or their staff to any kind of privileges, immunities or special status. Your NGO may mention that the organization is "associated with DPI".

Again, it is my pleasure to welcome your organization among NGOs associated with DPI and to assure you that the staff of the DPI NGO Relations Section looks forward to a productive partnership in pursuit of our common goals.
