In March 2020, the Commission adopted its first ever <u>LGBTIQ</u> equality strategy, which marked a new phase in the EU's efforts to address discrimination against lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, non-binary, intersex and queer (LGBTIQ) people. The strategy covers 2020-2025 and focuses on four pillars: (i) tackling discrimination; (ii) ensuring LGBTIQ people's safety; (iii) building LGBTIQ inclusive societies; and (iv) leading the call for LGBTIQ equality around the world.

Social acceptance of LGBTIQ people has increased across the EU since the adoption of the 2020-2025 LGBTIQ equality strategy. For instance, according to the 2023 special Eurobarometer on discrimination in the EU, Europeans are now more likely than in 2019 to feel comfortable if one of their children were in a same-sex relationship – 59% of those polled, up 4 percentage points (pps). At the same time, LGBTIQ people continue to experience disproportionate levels of discrimination, violence and harassment. The 2023 LGBTIQ survey of the European Union Agency for Fundamental Rights (FRA) showed a significant increase in hate-motivated harassment, with 55% of LGBTIQ people reporting such experiences (up 18 pps), as well as an increase in physical and sexual attacks in most EU countries.

Achieving a 'Union of Equality' was confirmed as a priority in President von der Leyen's political guidelines for 2024-2029, emphasising the EU's commitment to ensuring equal rights for all. Therefore, the Commission is working on a renewed strategy to combat the inequalities experienced by LGBTIQ people. The aim is to build on the progress achieved through the 2020-2025 LGBTIQ equality strategy and tackle any gaps, in full respect of Member States' competences. As mentioned by the President von der Leyen in her mission letter to the Commissioner for Equality, the new strategy will focus, among other things, on addressing 'the continued and persisting hate-motivated harassment and violence, including online, and banning the practice of conversion therapy'.

This consultation will enable the Commission to gather evidence on the areas requiring further action at EU level to advance LGBTIQ equality. It will collect input from Member State authorities to feed into the preparation of the new LGBTIQ equality strategy. This is a deliverable of the Commission's 2025 work programme.
